

Kamp Doctor: Donnie Barbra with Nurse Debbie Barbra: His growth as a musician resulted in Donnie becoming proficient in setting up and doing basic repair on his own instruments out of necessity. Around 1980 while working as manager of Maryville's Sound O Music, which became Murlin's Music World, Donnie moved to a professional level in the instrument repair business. Working with a full staff of music instructors created a demand for professional instrument repairs with a fast turnaround at the store. This led to Donnie's decision to take on the role of full-time repair professional in addition to being store manager. In his role as

manager of a full-line music store, Donnie had the added benefit of receiving tremendous technical support from the major instrument manufacturer's repair centers. Donnie does all the repairs on Steve's instruments and restored his 1932 C-3 Martin to playability.

Mike Cramer: A versatile multi-instrumentalist. Whether playing bluegrass, jazz, blues, or swing, he brings an infectious energy to the stage. A graduate of The University of Northern Iowa's School of Music, Mike has taught countless students for over 20 years. He has held teaching positions at Grinnell College, St. Paul Conservatory for Performing Artists, National Guitar Summer Workshop, and Brian Wicklund's Fiddle Pal Camp. Mike has authored seven books for Hal Leonard and his inventive flatpicking guitar arrangements have been featured in Flatpick Guitar Magazine. He has also contributed several articles for Premier Guitar Magazine. This class is limited to 18 Intermediate/Advanced students.

Billy Cardine: Billy Cardine has a way with his listeners. His distinctive voice powers through any instrument he plays, song that he composes, and album that he produces. Cardine has been recognized as a slide guitar pioneer, taking the dobro with him into unchartered genres. You can sense that he takes great pleasure in bringing the audience along for the ride: setting you off on a gentle float down a river before throwing you into the middle of a raging storm, only to drop you off on the other side, wondering what just happened.





Joe Wilson: Joe Wilson is probably best known for playing with longtime Michigan favorites, "Steppin' In It". With "Steppin' In It", Joe has played many of the nation's top concerts and festivals, including the Telluride Bluegrass Festival, Wheatland, Blissfest, Old Settlers Festival, The Woody Guthrie Festival, Woodsongs Old Time Radio Hour, and Live at Mountain Stage. In 2016, Joe started working on the "Dobro School", a collection of dobro instructional videos. Joe's donation-based website has earned him a place among the top online dobro instructors. Joe performs with various groups around Michigan and teaches private lessons both at his home in Lake Leelanau and over the internet.



Some Added Items for the 2024 Acoustic Kamps

Hammered Dulcimer, Old Time Fiddle, Old Time Banjo and Mountain Dulcimer now have two instructors. Therefor there will be one group beginner class and one intermediate/Advanced group. Instructors will alternate to both groups.

Three Great Classes: Celtic Fiddle, Celtic Guitar and Western Swing and Swing Rhythm Guitar. These classes have one instructor and are for Int/Adv students.

Old Time Barn Dance - During the Traditional Week we may hold a Barn Dance as we've done the last six years. This will happen Wednesday night of the first week. The Kamp String Band will play and we'll have Evie Ladin calling again.

Kamp Ensemble: Students will meet several times during the week and with the guidance of instructors and create a song together as a team. This helps build new friendships and jam partners sooner in the week, gives a new sense of teamwork and much more. Totally random groups are assembled. Monday, Wednesday and Friday

Class Scrambles and Master's Classes: Very popular pre-Covid and now back. Master's Classes will tentatively be Tuesday and Thursday from 4:10-5pm and the Class Scramble during the Thursday morning period.

Lunch at Check-In: Sunday Check-In is from 1-6 EST. There is no college food service on campus until 5:00 pm dinner. Grab something to eat on your way in.

Two Week Kampers: Saturday Stay Package. We have put together a special package for the folks staying two weeks. You stay in your first week room without having to pack out. You have your Saturday lunch, dinner and Sunday breakfast. The "Stay Over" charge with all taxes and fees included is \$95.00.

Casey Henry: Born in Florida and moved with her family to Winchester, Virginia, when she was eight. Raised in a family of musicians, at age 12 she started getting interested in bluegrass and took up the bass fiddle, joining her parents' band at 14. The next year, Casey studied the playing of Earl Scruggs with a passion, often driving long distances and camping in her beloved pickup truck at bluegrass festivals. She played in a succession of local and regional bands throughout high school and college. Along with playing music, Casey recorded several DVDs. She gives private lessons in Winchester, Va., and online, and teaches at camps around the country throughout the year.





Lincoln Hensley: Lincoln Hensley is fast making a name for himself as a Sonny Osborne protégé and a snappy dresser. He takes the music seriously without taking himself too seriously and his playing just makes you smile. A graduate of the East TN State Univ bluegrass program, Lincoln can be heard with the Price Sisters and on the weekly internet music series "Tone Tuesdays" along with ETSU professor Dan Boner and fiddler Aynsley Porchak. He lives in East Tennessee.

Justin Hitner: IBMA Award nominee Justin Hiltner is a banjo player and songwriter based in Nashville, TN. His high-energy, Scruggs-style picking is unique in its combination of traditional aesthetic and progressive, outside-thebox thinking. Having a dynamic, variable voice on the banjo has given him opportunities across genres, not simply in straight-ahead bluegrass or "newgrass" alone, but also in folk, country, singer/songwriter, and Celtic. His original songs don't fall neatly into any of these genre labels, but are instead focused on their stories - which are intensely personal, while maintaining relatability and accessibility. His debut solo album finished and awaiting release in fall 2021, it's a collection of stripped down, unencumbered originals - just a songwriter, his banjo, and his songs.





Alan Munde: Alan needs no introduction to long-time Bluegrass fans. From his early creative work with Sam Bush in Poor Richard's Almanac to his traditional bluegrass apprenticeship with Jimmy Martin and the Sunny Mountain Boys to his 21-year stint anchoring the landmark Country Gazette, Alan has blazed a trail as one of the most innovative and influential banjo players of all time. Along the way, Alan also recorded numerous instrumental recordings, including the 2001 IBMA Instrumental Album of the Year - Knee Deep in Blue-

Amanda and Kenny Smith: The award-winning duo of Kenny & Amanda Smith have cultivated a reputation of delivering fresh, heartfelt, bluegrass music to stages worldwide for nearly two decades. Known for sincere vocals and stellar musicianship, Kenny & Amanda Smith are one of the most beloved husband-and-wife teams in acoustic music. Passion permeates everything that Kenny & Amanda Smith do, both in life and in music. On stage or in the studio, their love for each other comes across in their music, resulting in a rare chemistry that resonates with both longtime and first-time listeners. For nearly twenty years, their music has pulled on the heartstrings of fans of bluegrass and beyond, creating a lasting lega-



cy that has made them one of the genre's most beloved duos of the 21st century. While making music together is their passion, their proudest role is that of parents to their beautiful daughter, Annabelle.

Sami Braman: Sami has been playing the fiddle since she was 6 years old, coming up amid the music festivals and jamming communities of the Pacific Northwest's vibrant traditional Old-Time music scene. Under the instruction of fiddle tradition-bearer Ruthie Dornfeld, she studied both classical and fiddle music. Sami now teaches and performs across the U.S., primarily with The Onlies and Willie Watson (David Rawlings Machine, Old Crow Medicine Show). In her teaching, she brings positive engagement and a high standard that encourages and challenges students. Sami recently moved to Nashville, TN, to pursue music full-time. To all her projects Sami brings joyful energy, a driving bow, and an abiding love for the traditional music community which formed her. Darol Anger told Steve - Hire Sami - She plays me better than I do!

Josh Goforth: Josh must have been born musical—he was already playing piano in church at the age of four—but it was an experience he had in the sixth grade that really lit the fuse of his precocious musical career. A performance at Goforth's middle school by Sheila Kay Adams caused him to start thinking about the musical heritage and stories of his native Madison County, NC. A couple of years later, he received his first guitar from one of his great-uncles, and began to learn the instrument under the tutelage of another great-uncle. The great-great-grandson of Madison County fiddler Asbury McDevitt was launched on a career in traditional music.





Aynsley Porchak: Aynsley began playing fiddle at the age of 9. She was introduced to bluegrass in her early teens, and quickly fell in love with the music. In order to further hone her craft, Aynsley enrolled in East Tennessee State University's Bluegrass, Old Time, and Country Music Studies degree program in 2013. She graduated in 2017 with an additional bachelor's degree in English, and completed her master's degree in Appalachian Studies in 2020. She also received the 2018 IBMA Momentum Instrumentalist of the Year award. Aynsley spends her time off the road as a private fiddle instructor, session musician, and author.

Songwriting Class with Jerry Salley

Referred to by Billboard Magazine as "One of Music Row's greatest veteran tunesmiths," Jerry Salley has had an incredibly successful, multi award-winning songwriting career. Nominated in 2019 for the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame, Salley is the 2018 & 2019 IBMA (International Bluegrass Music Association) Songwriter of the Year and was named the 2003 SESAC Country Music Songwriter of the Year. Salley has had over 540 different songs recorded and his songs have sold in excess of 18 million records worldwide. Writing and singing in Nashville since 1982, he has written multiple hits in country, bluegrass, and gospel music and may well be the most successful songwriter to have earned equal recognition from all three genres of music. Jerry is a 2020 Grammy nominated producer in the Gospel Roots category. Class Size Limited to 15 Students

Tony teaches ukulele classes workshops, as well as leading dozens of ukulele jams. This includes Minnesota Bluegrass and Old-Time Music Association classes, workshops and jams, Steve Kaufman Acoustic Kamp, Port Townsend Ukulele Festival and numerous local and regional "music happenings." Tony founded the Twin Cities Ukulele Club, and he organizes and leads TC Uke Club events, including both the Great Minnesota Uke Gathering the Winter Oo-koo-lay-lay Weekend. Tony's classes and teaching style provide an environment for ukulele learners that is caring, encouraging, and 100% non-threatening. This class is geared towards beginners through early advanced students.

Our Kamp's class structure is unique and different from any other music camp in the world. ⇒ Our facilities are on the campus of the spacious, scenic and historic Maryville College in the foothills of the Great Smoky Mountains. The Mandolin Team - June 16-22, 2024





Emory Lester: One of this day's foremost exponents of the acoustic mandolin. His landmark recording projects have placed him among the elite mandolinists of our time. His most recent solo CD 'At Dusk' showcases Emory's multi-instrumentalist musical creativity and skills. Undeniably, his clean, clear, fast and efficient mandolin techniques continue to influence many modern-day mandolinists. Emory has also been a prominent music instructor since 1978, and often teaches at prestigious music camps such as the Mandolin Symposium, the Steve Kaufman's Acoustic Kamps, Swannanoa Gathering, Acoustic Alaska Guitar Camp, as well as many other notable instructional events.

John Moore: John has been playing guitar and mandolin for over 35 years, performing professionally for over 28 years, and teaching for more than 25 years. He has taught, and continues to teach, at numerous music camps, including Wintergrass Academy (WA), Steve Kaufman's Acoustic Kamp (TN), Bluegrass On The Beach (OR), Sore Fingers Music Camp (England), Rockygrass Academy (CO), Northern Bluegrass Circle Music Camp (AB, Canada), Levelland College (TX) and Northern Minn. Bluegrass Camp (MN) among many others.



Jordan Ramsey: Jordan Ramsey, the 2016 National Mandolin Champion, is an award-winning mandolinist and teacher residing in the Front Range area of Colorado. A native of Tennessee, he attended the Bluegrass and Country Music Program at East Tennessee State University and played with the school's premiere bluegrass ensemble.

A lifelong student of the mandolin, Jordan has studied with mandolin masters David Grisman, Andy Statman, Evan Marshall, and Jack Tottle. Contest highlights include: 2008 RockyGrass Mandolin Champion, five time top-five finalist in the National Mandolin Championship in Winfield, KS.

Don Stiernberg: A professional musician for nearly 50 years. Along the way he has been involved in performing, writing, recording, producing, and teaching, but is best known for his mandolin playing. His path was set very early on as he grew up north of Chicago. Emulating his older brother, he experimented with playing various stringed instruments, finally landing on the mandolin. Things got serious when an ad played on the radio: "Study Mandolin with the great Jethro Burns"... At his first lesson he discovered what he wanted to do: play the mandolin, be a musician, and try to be as cool as Jethro Burns! Within a few short years he was playing professionally, first in a bluegrass band with his brother, later standing right next to his hero in The Jethro Burns Quartet.



There was no turning back, and thanks to encouragement and mentorship from his family and hero he is still out there trying to achieve those early goals.



Steve Smith: Performing for nearly thirty years in about as many types of musical situations as one can imagine. He has appeared as a solo artist, bandleader, in-demand sideman, session player and producer in traditional bluegrass (his first love), old-time, Celtic, new acoustic, jazz and chamber music. His deep Virginia roots and thirty years of traveling the country give him a hard driving unique instrumental sound coupled with a powerful tenor. Besides his recordings with Sanders and Hard Road (Meet Me by the River, Only so Fast and Signs Along the Road), he can be heard on XM Radio on cuts from Made to Last (2008), his recording with the Alan Munde Gazette.

Dan Boner: The Director of Bluegrass, Old Time, and Country Music Studies at East Tennessee State University, where he teaches private vocal and instrumental instruction and leads the program's renowned ETSU Bluegrass Pride Band. He has presented workshops and master classes in band performance, vocal health and technique, record production, and bluegrass music history at institutions in the United States, Scotland, and Japan. He holds a B.M. in Vocal Music Education from ETSU and will soon complete a M.M. in Music Education from Boston University.

Rebecca Frazier: Originally from Virginia, Frazier is perhaps best known for her work with Hit & Run Bluegrass, which made history as the only band to win competitions at Rockygrass (2002), Telluride Bluegrass Festival (2003), and the SPBGMA Band Championship in Nashville (2005). Driven by Rebecca's leadership, Hit & Run became one of Colorado's most electrifying acoustic touring acts. According to Denver's Westword, "Something's got to be up when one bluegrass band suddenly surpasses all the others." Dan Miller writes, "Rebecca has worked incredibly hard...to get where she is today. And although she



has achieved great success, she continues to be very passionate about her music and her guitar playing.."



Jim Hurst: Born in Middleboro, Kentucky into a musical family and was raised with a guitar in his hands. Many weekends growing up were spent picking with family and friends. Jim was influenced early in his career by flat-pickers such as Tony Rice and George Shuffler, Doc Watson and Clarence White and others. To listen to Jim Hurst is to be amazed by his tasteful and flawless performances. Perfect timing and tone and his unusual picking style has enchanted guitar players from the novice to his peers. It's no surprise, then, that his musical mastery began with a musical upbringing paving the way for a winding and varied career path.

Tim May: Working in the Nashville area for over 20 years as a sideman, session player, band member and performer. Higher profile projects have included touring with Patty Loveless and John Cowan, and working as a regular on the Grand Ole Opry with Mike Snider. Tim was the solo guitarist on Charlie Daniels' recording of I'll Fly Away, which was nominated for the Best Country Instrumental Performance Grammy in 2005, the same year he was session leader on the critically acclaimed Moody Bluegrass album (he later played on Moody Bluegrass II as well).





Jeff Troxel: Jeff performs around the country at festivals and concerts, and his music has been featured on several public television shows. His instructional books are published by Mel Bay and FGM, and he has won performing arts fellowships for songwriting and jazz composition. He is also a former state and national guitar flatpicking champion. This is Jeff's first time teaching at Kamp. Welcome Jeff!

Bluegrass Guitar Rhythm - Wayne Taylor

Wayne Taylor has North Carolina roots, but has spent most of his career traveling the world with the U.S. Navy band, Country Current. He's performed for presidents, ambassadors, foreign dignitaries, and audiences around the globe, both military and civilian. Taylor is retired from the military now, with more time for his four country and bluegrass bands. Hear his story, and listen to his Flatt & Scruggs bluegrass tribute, "Salty Dog Blues", and "A Legend In My Own Time" from his Great American Country Band.

require a taxi and we will help you make the arrangements during Kamp.



What To Bring to the Acoustic Kamp



An Audio Recorder:

Be sure to bring a audio recorder to record your classes and preserve your Kamp experience.

NO VIDEO RECORDERS IN THE CLASS ROOMS

Video Camera: You can video the concerts if the artists have no objections. This will be let known at the beginning of their concert.

Instruments, picks, capo... multiple instruments are encouraged for better jams.

Linens: Bring your own. Be prepared to bring a pillow and sleeping bag or Twin Tall size sheets, blanket, wash cloths, towels along with soaps and shampoo. You may also want to bring a fitted mattress pad to avoid contact with the plastic covered mattress.

Linen Rentals are available but you need to reserve before May 31 - no exceptions. The college needs to reserve them ten days in advance. Linen Sets include: bottom and top sheet, thin college blanket, small college pillow, tiny college washcloth and towel - Call 865-982-3808 to reserve before May 31. Cost: \$27.00. Extra sets may also be ordered before May 31.

For Your Room: Small trash can, maybe shower slippers and a bath caddy. The college will provide garbage bags for you to keep up with your trash but they do not supply trash cans. You may want to bring a small receptacle for your room.

Clothing: Our June temperature is generally between 70-95 Fahrenheit during the day and 60-70 degrees in the evening. The humidity is between 75% and 110% due to the Great Smoky Mountains 20 miles away. Bring appropriate clothing, raincoat, umbrella, comfortable shoes, etc. Most classrooms are air conditioned. All dorm rooms are air conditioned. Classes are held in several buildings with up to a 5 minute walk. Stair climbing is necessary. There is a laundry in most dorm buildings.

Communication Devices: Open Wireless Internet is available throughout the campus. Sign on to "Scotts" and there is no password. We will learn more at the College orientation.

A Flashlight: For getting around to those late night jams. We do have lights in Tennessee but this is just another something you may want to pack with you.

A Watch/Battery Powered Alarm Clock: (optional but advisable - late evenings with early morning risings.) No Wake Up Service is provided (g).

A Desk Lamp: The college dorms have only overhead lighting. A small bed lamp or desk lamp might be nice to have. A small fan for the room might be nice as well. All rooms have AC.

Spending Money (and lots of it): All of the instructors and performers will have tapes, CD's and/or instructional books and DVDs for sale. All money goes to the artist and instructors (and the government, of course).

Our Kamp is more of an instrumental technique learning music camp than a strumming and back-up music camp. Our goal is to train you to play solos and melodies on your instrument, as well as back up and rhythm techniques. Keep this in mind as you choose your level. A guitarist with 30 years strumming and singing would still be considered a high beginner with no real "picking" experience. A violinist with 20 years of classical experience may still be barely an intermediate "Fiddler". Just because you have played your instrument for many years, does not qualify your proficiency level to be an advanced level. Please be accurate for your level. Thank you for your honesty in this placement. Register as you wish now and you may reassess your level in May. Nothing is cast in stone, you may choose to change level after your first class as well after seeing Donna for reassignment.

Beginning Class Level One: Guitar, Fiddle, Mandolin, Old Time Banjo and Bass during Week One and Guitar, Banjo, Bass, Fiddle and Mandolin during Week Two: True beginners know nothing about the instrument. The student level ranges from never had touched an instrument before (be sure to bring one) to being able to strum a few chords but may not really know what to do with them. No music theory or music reading skills required! You will stay with the same instructor the entire Kamp. No class rotations. You will have a blast and get yourself ready to be at least in the beginners class for the following year.

Old Time Mandolin, Old Time Singing have only one instructor each. If the class size grows to over fifteen, a second instructor will be added. Therefore the separation of levels (listed below) is not necessary. If a second instructor is added, you will be contacted for better class level placement.

Hammered Dulcimer, Old Time Banjo and Mountain Dulcimer now have two instructors and classes will be divided by Beginners in one and Intermediate/Advanced students in the other.

Beginners:

All Instruments: A beginner is someone just started playing or is not yet comfortable playing at the tempos required for jam sessions. Beginner focus will be on rhythm and easy leads. Should know basic open chords, 3-6 chords at least: G, C, D, A, E and maybe F. Maybe also their minor counterparts. Should be able to strum and change chords easily and steadily. Should know 2 to 12 simple songs, playing them by using single notes. Quarter notes good for the melodies. A knowledge of reading tablature is a huge plus, but not necessary. Should be able to tune their instrument by ear or with a tuner, put on the picks if used, know which string is which (first, second, etc.) and the names of the strings.

Fingerpickers and Banjo Players: Should know a couple of basic rolls, (Forward, backward, alternating thumb). Banjo—should be able to play ONE song all the way thru, preferably Cripple Creek or Boil Them Cabbage. Fingerstyle guitarist should be comfortable with at least one fingerpicking pattern.

Dobro (TM) Players: You know most or all of the straight-bar chords and might pick a few licks out of those bar positions. You may have memorized a G major scale but still don't know what to do with it. Still need to work a lot on picking and barring technique.

Fiddlers: You can play 1 octave scales such as A and D. You know some songs and fiddle tunes at a slow to moderate tempo. You are concentrating primarily on playing in tune, getting good tone and controlling the bow. You may know the basic shuffle bowing (Long short short, LSS)

Mandolin and Flatpickers: Should be comfortable using the pick, basic chords, should know 2 to 12 simple instrumental songs, playing them by using single notes. Quarter notes good for the melodies, but do not have to be up to speed.

Old Time Banjo Pickers: (but not new pickers) - Have some experience with the right hand Clawhammer technique and understand that it is NOT the same as Fingerpicking. Helpful to know a few chords in G

Bass: You can play an alternating bass line (root-fifth) on easy songs using mostly open strings. You're just starting to get a good solid bass sound. You can hold a somewhat steady rhythm while playing the bass line. You're learning to damp the strings after hitting them.

Intermediates: All **Instruments:** All of the above *plus...* Should be able to comfortably play chords, some scales and be able to get a good sound from the instrument. Can change chords and play some solos at jam session tempos. Should be becoming aware of the instrument's role in a group situation and be asking questions such as: "How do I backup another musician or singer?" or "How do I play solos up the neck?" or "How can I learn to play faster?" Focus on Rhythm Back-up and Solos for standard tunes.

Fiddle: You can play at least a single octave major scale in common keys A, D, G, C, F. Some of these scales in minor keys. You are comfortable using the full bow. You can play some double stops. You can play slurs and slides. You use drone strings. You are somewhat comfortable using your 4th finger. You have good rhythm and intonation and have played with other folks some. Play at least 10-20 instrumental tunes from memory.

Flatpickers and Mandolins: Plectrum users should be able to play some fiddle tunes using appropriate alternating strokes at a moderate tempo. Understand movable chords. Transpose chords from one key to



another. Play some tunes with variations. Play at least 10-20 instrumental tunes from memory. You can recognize I, IV and V chord patterns. You know minor seventh chord and diminished chord forms. You play well with others and are used to jamming.

Fingerpickers: Should be able to keep alternate bass going during a tune, should know first position chords and understand how they translate up the neck. Play at least 7-20 instrumental tunes from memory. Not just a roll style back-up for singing like Dust in the Wind etc. More like Freight Train, Alice's Restaurant, etc. in Travis style or the like.

Banjo Players: Should be able to play 3-4 different rolls up to speed. Should know 1st and 2nd position chords and hopefully 3rd position chords. Should be able to interchange rolls and riffs. Should be able to play the off beat (2 and 4 beat) rhythm "Chunk" back up. You can play several rolls, and they're smooth and in good rhythm. You can do at least one intro lick and one ending for bluegrass songs. Play at least 10-20 instrumental tunes from memory like Cripple Creek, Salt Creek, Old Joe Clark, etc., Foggy Mt. Breakdown.

Old Time Banjo Pickers: Right hand technique in Clawhammer style should be solid. Able to change chords in G tuning and double C (or double D) tuning. Must be able to play several songs and tune in each tuning. Play at least 10-20 instrumental tunes from memory

Dobro (TM): You feel confident holding the bar, sliding, picking, and trying hammer-ons and pull-offs, even if you still make a lot of mistakes. Know a few scales, and chord changes. Probably only comfortable in 2 or 3 Keys. Several songs in your repertoire. Interested in refining technique and sounding better.

Bass: You can play comfortably in the keys of C, G, D, A and E. You've played with other folks a fair amount. You can play at least three major scales. You play with good rhythm. You can do some runs between one chord and the next. You can play other bass notes than the root and the fifth (such as the third) and know where to use them. You can play other rhythmic patterns besides the standard 1st and 3rd beat.

Advanced:

All Instruments: Should have a large repertoire. Interested in the finer points of improvising and experiencing music as a language. Should have a basic knowledge of music theory and realize that an ever expanding knowledge of theory will open more doors to them. Should be striving for more precision and mastery of both the right hand and the fingerboard. Should be able to learn without tablature, to improvise a little and have some understanding of playing up the neck. Should be performing in bands or solo or just on the edge of being able to do so.

Mandolin: Should be able to play solos on bluegrass songs. Have some knowledge of double stops. Should be able to jam comfortably with others. Some improvisation skills.

Fiddle: You learn new tunes quickly (by sight reading or by ear). You are comfortable with 3rd position, and may also play in 2nd, 4th and 5th positions. You can back up others in a jam using double stops and chops. You can improvise some leads. You play well with others and are used to jamming at a pretty fast tempo. You play (or can play) double shuffle bowing and Georgia shuffle bowing. You can play a variety of stylistic ornaments like trills, rolls, slides, and drones with 4th finger slide. You are comfortable playing in most keys. You're an experienced jammer or performer. You can play well at a fast tempo

Fingerstyle: Always keep alternate bass, even with hammers and pulls both on and off the beat, play (and maybe understand) chords up the neck, be familiar with two or more styles (e.g., jazz and country, or folk and blues), should have some ability to improvise while playing solo. You can work out fingerpicking arrangements including bass lines and treble harmonies.

Old Time and Bluegrass Banjo: You are an experienced jammer or performer. You play melodic leads comfortably and at a variety of speeds. You can play with dynamic control. Your rhythm is rock-solid. You can improvise on most any tune or song.

Dobro (TM): You've probably taken combined beg/intermediate/advanced classes before and felt they moved too slowly. Even if you can't quite do them up to speed, you have many songs in your repertoire, including a few fiddle tunes that require some intricate barring and picking. Hammer-ons and pull-offs aren't a problem, and you've practiced incorporating rolls into your bluegrass solos. Overall, you're starting to sound pretty good when jamming with your friends. This class will be divided into a beginner group and an Int/Adv group.

Bass: Your rhythm is rock-solid. You're an experienced jammer or performer. You understand the theory of the chords you're backing up. You're comfortable with many different styles of playing. You can play a walking bass in all keys using closed-position notes.

All Instruments: Should be extremely comfortable with their instrument. Should be able to improvise somewhat melodically in most keys without the sole use of pentatonic or blues scales. Be a theme or melody player with continuity. Should have comprehensive ideas on how music fits together. Should play with compassion and feeling for those around them trying to keep up. Should be able to play what you are thinking, not thinking about what you wish you could play.
